A particular project in which the district was in the process of "constructing 2 grade bonded elementary buildings" with SUMMIT CONSTRUC-TION Company. The company approached the district school at the onset of the school building plans. Thus a partnership was formed..The high school students were interviewed and

selected based on their interest and future goals. The particular student that was highlighted online was pursuing a civil engineer program and interested in attending University of Dayton or University of Cinncinatti upon graduation.


